Elwha Tribe Negotiates Downtown Land Purchase

The Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe and the City of Port Angeles have started negotiations for an agreement by which the Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe will purchase from the City the property located at 111 E Front Street. The Tribe anticipates building on the property a multi-story four-star hotel with an indoor restaurant, an outdoor restaurant, meeting spaces, and a bar.

The City declared the property as surplus in 2008 and authorized its sale. Earlier this year, the City requested proposals from interested parties. The City evaluated two proposals and selected the Tribe's. If the negotiations are successful, both parties anticipate the sale closing by mid-summer. The Tribe anticipates it will complete architectural plans and begin construction before the end of the year on a four story hotel that will include 86 guest rooms, a 112-seat indoor restaurant, a 64-seat outdoor restaurant, a 64-seat bar, and office and meeting spaces. An initial concept drawing shows the hotel oriented to face Railroad Avenue to take advantage of the water views to the North.

This hotel project is a part of an exciting revitalization of downtown Port Angeles that also includes the new performing arts center, the Lincoln Theater remodel, and the new west end park. The Tribe is committed to working with the existing tenants located on the property. Both the City and the Tribe anticipate successful negotiations and expect the hotel project to be a sig-

nificant step towards creating a better Port Angeles downtown. Chairwoman Frances Charles noted: "The Tribe decided, about a year ago, to invest in downtown. We are excited with the opportunity to invest in Port Angeles and work with the City and downtown business partners contributing to the revitalization effort."

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Vice Chair's Letter to the Community



Dear Lower Elwha Tribal Community, contact the Fisheries Office.

It has been a busy four months dealing with fishery issues. The Northwest Tribes, Doug Morrill and I finally got a deal done with the states of Washing-

hours and days working to be sure the salmon had a chance to come back to their spawning grounds. The State of Washington finally got what, "No", means. They closed a number of areas for different stocks of concern. Meaning that these stocks were not returning to spawn or their numbers of population were very low. I told the state that tribes don't say, "No" just to spite them, we say it to conserve the salmon. We have been doing this for thousands of years. We know when the fish can't take anymore harvest. We only take what we need. We need to deal with habitat issues. The state always addresses declining numbers of fish with harvest reduction, usually wanting the tribes to reduce our harvest. We can't manage by only harvest, we need to deal with habitat also. We need to protect and preserve the habitat we have. But...this is something we continue to say every year. I am optimistic that they heard us and it will carry over into next year.

We came out of the negotiations pretty intact. Of course we don't have the effort to fish like we used to have. But we have sockeye, if we ever get a run back. We have some Coho, chum, steelhead and chinook. We kept the purse seine vessels harvest of chum to only one day a week in Hood Canal.

The Elwha River still has the moratorium on it. I hope in a few more years we can get back in it. We still really don't know what that will look like as far as gear type and where. I am anxious to get fishing in the Elwha. My 10 year old son Nyle is ready also. If you would like to see the regulations or any of this, please

At the end of April I will be traveling back to Washington D. C. to represent the Elwha People and the Puget Sound. The federal government is threatening to strip money from the Environmental Protection Agenton and California, Canada and Alaska. We put in long cy. This will literally stop all funding for restoration efforts around the Puget Sound. It will greatly affect our efforts in the Straits of Juan de Fuca. Representatives from various local and state governments, environmental groups, shellfish industry and tribes are heading to D. C. to talk to congress people about the funding and why it is important to keep it going.

> It is election time and I hope you exercise your right to vote. This is the very back bone of our community. To me it is the most important part of our constitution. This year there are seven nominees running for two seats. One of which is mine, also Joe Turrey. Please take the time to vote either by mail-in ballot or coming down to the tribal center to vote in person. It isn't hard to vote. Just make two checks in the boxes, sign the affidavit, put the ballot in the secure envelope, and put that in the other envelope and mail in. I think that a lot of our eligible voters don't bother. That is just sad.

> Thank you for taking the time to read my letter. This is one of the few ways that I can keep you informed about what I am doing to help out our tribe. As always, my door is open, I answer or return your phone calls or I talk to you in person. Tell me what you think but you may have to listen for a while if you ask me what I think.

Elwha Klallam Tribe Wins Court Decision in Hatchery Litigation

The Lower Elwha Tribe is pleased with the April 18, 2017 Memorandum decision of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, which affirmed the legality of the Tribe's Elwha River Hatchery under the Endangered Species Act (ESA) and also affirmed that the federal agencies had complied



with their obligations under the ESA and the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) when they approved the Tribe's hatchery plans for four difference species of native Elwha River anadromous fish.

The Ninth Circuit decision affirmed prior rulings of the federal district court in the lawsuit originally filed in Feb. 2012. The lawsuit was filed by four wild fish advocacy organizations alleging that the Tribe's hatchery caused harm to (or "take" of) several fish species in the Elwha River and that the Tribe lacked any exemption from such "take" liability in the form of approval from the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) (also known as NOAA Fisheries). At that time, the Tribe was in the final stages of revising its hatchery management plans in order to obtain such approval from NMFS. By the end of 2012, NOMFS had granted its approval and issued a Biological Opinion mandating various terms and conditions that the hatchery operators must observe. At that point, the district court ruled that the claim against the Tribe's hatchery operators had become moot and dismissed them from the case. The plaintiffs continued to litigate their other issues against the federal agency defendants. In 2015 those issues were resolved in favor of the federal defendants and the plaintiffs appealed, including an appeal of the ruling that the claim against the tribal defendants was moot. The April 18 Ninth Circuit decision affirmed the lower court on all issues.

The Ninth Circuit decision is succinct and to the point regarding the various legal claims in the appeal but it

does not provide much background to the history of the Elwha hatchery and fish restoration programs or the history of the litigation in the district court. Although litigation always has an element of risk or uncertainty, the Tribe had been confident of the outcome on appeal because we had worked

closely and carefully for many years with our federal and state agency partners, and the independent scientific community, to develop a comprehensive fishery and ecosystem restoration program. That included development of the hatchery programs that were approved by the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) (also known as NOAA Fisheries), together with NMFS's associated Biological Opinion, under the 4(d) rule of the Endangered Species Act, which provides the Tribe with an exemption from any ESA take liability.

A major purpose of the Tribe's hatchery programs is to ensure the preservation of native salmon and steelhead stocks, and their associated genetic makeup, during the heavy discharge of sediment in the early years after dam removal as well as the longer term restoration of these native stocks to all of the newly accessible native fish habitat, which remains in pristine condition due to its location within Olympic National Park. In fact, NMFS concluded that dam removal would not violate the Endangered Species Act because the Tribe's hatchery would protect the native fish runs from extirpation (local extinction). The Tribe operates four programs at its Elwha River Hatchery for four different species, all of them native to the Elwha River - Steelhead, Coho Salmon, Pink Salmon, and Chum Salmon. The Hatchery raises and releases only native Elwha fish into the Elwha River and does not raise or release any fish from other basins.


Tribal Council Meets with South Korean Guests



Lower Elwha Klallam Tribal Council and staff met with South Korean visitors. The Korean group included environmental biologists, scientist, translator, news reporter and photographer for the OhMyNews journal.

A delegation from the OhMyNews newspaper from South Korea visited the Lower Elwha Tribal Council on Monday, April 10, 2017. The group included environmentalists, a journalist, a photographer, and translator that were here to garner as much information as possible regarding dam removal and river restoration.

There are a number of rivers in South Korea that are encumbered by outdated dams, and environmentalists there are exploring best practices for dam removal. The group's focus was specifically to learn how the Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe has been successful with dam removal and restoration work.



Mike McHenry, river biologist, presented scientific information via a power point presentation. The presentation included process for systematic dam removal, sediment flow, health of salmon and other wildlife, and revegetation.

The South Korean group was very appreciative of the time and extensive knowledge that the Tribal Council and biologist Mike McHenry shared. Council Members attending the meeting were: Chairwoman Frances Charles, Secretary/Treasurer Anthony Charles, and Council Member Joe Turrey. COO Tracey Hosselkus, biologist Mike McHenry, and Sherry Curran joined the discussion.

Note that the Ninth Circuit's Decision also applies to NMFS's approval of the State of Washington's Chinook Salmon hatchery located a couple of miles upstream from the Tribe's hatchery on the Elwha River

As with all Pacific Northwest tribes, fishing has always been of supreme cultural, economic, and ceremonial importance to the Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe. The aboriginal village of Elwha, at the mouth of the Elwha River on the Strait of Juan de Fuca where The Tribe's present-day reservation is located - was represented as a signatory to the 1855 Treaty of Point No Point, in which the Tribe reserved the right of taking fish in all usual and accustomed places. This right has been repeatedly affirmed in many of the decisions in the long-running, seminal case U.S. v. Washington. The coming of the dams in 1913 largely thwarted the fulfillment of the treaty fishing promise in the Tribe's native river and depleted the native fisheries to the brink of extirpation (local extinction). It would be supremely ironic if the short-term impact of dam removal, which occurred from 2011-14, were to have been the extirpation of the remnants of the native fish runs, and their unique genetics, due to the heavy sediment load that had accumulated behind the dams for a century. The fisheries scientists recognize four distinct phases of the overall process to restore the native fisheries: preservation; re-



colonization of the newly accessible habitat; local adaptation; achievement of naturally self-sustaining populations (without need for hatchery assistance). Although some salmon species, and Steelhead, have begun to return to the natural habitat above the dam sites, the experts note that overall we are still in the preservation phase. The Ninth Circuit decision will allow the Tribe and the federal and state agencies to continue to utilize the hatchery programs, in conformance with the terms and conditions of NMFS's Biological Opinion that accompanied their approval, as part of their comprehensive restoration efforts.

Nutrition Spotlight

Spring is upon us with more natural light. More sunlight feeds the body, especially our brain and mood. This months topic is: "Nutrition for Brain Health"!

The human brain is almost 60% fat and brain growth is done by age 5-6. Omega 3 fats are very important during both the prenatal and postnatal period as these fats affect not only brain development, but also vision.

Here is a list of 7 foods that affect brain health. Include them into your diet and your child's diet as often as you can.

Eggs: the protein and nutrients help concentration.

Greek yogurt: Use full fat yogurt. The fat helps to keep the brain cells in good working order.

Greens: spinach and kale are loaded with folate and vitamins that research has shown can lower your risk of dementia. Kale also helps new cells grow. If you don't like these, try sneaking them into an omelet or blend in a smoothie. Making kale chips is delicious.

a supplement.




Nuts and seeds: the protein and minerals can boost mood and keeps your nervous system in check.

Slapu was walking to the lake. Chipmunk (xa?xiyu?é?č) was playing there at the lake. And Slapu went to look at Chipmunk (xa?xiyu?é?č). He ran toward Slapu and said "Come on Grandma" (síya?)! Come out here and play, Grandma (síya?)!" She replied, "No, The Lake is very soft. I'll get stuck if I get near." He was out on the ice on the lake and said "Grandma (siya?), this is hard. The ice is hard. Come, Grandma (síya?), play!" Again she told him, "No. If I go play, I'll probably get stuck. I'll go get some rocks and throw them. And see if they break through the ice." He continued to say to yell at her saying, "Come, Grandma (síya?), come out and play!" She told him again, "No. I'll probably go in. The ice is very thin. The ice is too thin. I'll go through if I step on it." He replied "Oh, no. The ice is very thick." She thought about it awhile, and said, "No. I'm going to sing (ťíyəm). I'm going to sing for cold (\fartarangle 4area) weather so that the ice will get thick and then I can go out play with you Chipmunk (xa?xiyu?é?č)."As Slapu started singing (tíyəm) for cold (4á?4a?či), Chipmunk started singing (tíyəm) a song to make it rain (s4áməx*). They were both singing (tíyəm)! Slapu out sang Chipmunk (xa?xiyu?é?č), and the ice got thick! She went out onto the hard frozen ice and Chipmunk (xa?xiyu?é?č) started running away from her. He was teasing her "You can't catch me Grandma (síya?)! I am fast!" And he kept running away on the ice, but Slapu wasn't far behind. She was reaching for him and she just barely grabbed at him and she managed to scratch his back just before he out ran her. He got off the ice and ran far away, but he still had a long scratch down his back from Slapu. If you see a chipmunk (xa?xiyu?é?č) today, they still have a long stripe down their back from where Slapu scratched him long ago!






