


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Expressing Thanks

Happy New Year! Here we are in January, the Sun-Has-Not-Strength-To-Thaw Moon. Now we begin the last few months of winter, and soon we will be longing for the sunlight, warmth, and first signs of spring. It is a time for rebirth, for new beginnings, for leaving the old behind and embracing the new wonders to be discovered.

Here at the Lower Elwha Tribe, the future is indeed bright. A lot of new things coming our way. For example, you will see construction starting soon on a new Head Start facility, with completion by the end of the year. This will provide a new home for our expanding youth population and give them the grounding and skills they need to compete and excel in their educational efforts.

You will also see the initial stages of development around the downtown property recently purchased. This early work is to demolish the existing structures, excavate the sub-soil to remove all historical contaminates and provide for stable footing for the structure(s) to be built there.

You should hear more on our work with local partners on the Performing Arts Center. This project is complimentary to the hotel project, each supporting the other. The goal here is to construct something along the lines of a traditional longhouse, that can serve as restaurant and entertainment center, as well as meet various Tribal cultural needs.

Work should occur at Tse-whit-zen, to memorialize this site for future generations, so all will learn and understand that the Elwha people have lived here for thousands of years, and will continue to do so for thousands of years to come.

And you should also see efforts initiated to expand on workforce development. We know that the hotel planned for downtown will require staffing. We can anticipate the nature of many of those jobs...from the early phases of demolition and construction, to the longer lasting jobs of hotel management, hospitality coordinators, chefs, wait staff, maintenance personnel, maids and bell hops...all the jobs needed to run a successful lodging experience. We need to get members trained to compete for these essential positions.

The Performing Arts demands are somewhat different, with anticipated needs for individuals who can entertain while educating, singers and storytellers, dancers, and those with a flair for theatrics. This could also become an intertribal venue, serving as a gate way to our sister tribes on the peninsula too.

So let us look forward to good news, exciting developments, and continued growth and prosperity of our community. Wishing all of you a very happy New Year, and hope all your wishes and resolutions come true.



Applications for college level courses will be available Monday 12/2/2018 for the 2019-2020 School Year. Applications will be due Monday 4/15/2019.




