


HAPPY BIRTHDAY BILLY FRANK JR.! **MARCH 9**TH

Every year, the treaty tribes in Western Washington observe Billy Frank Jr.'s birthday on March 9.

The fishing rights warrior and longtime chairman of the Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission lived from March 9, 1931 to May 5, 2014.

Tell the Truth: The Collected Columns of Billy Frank Jr.

For years, as Chairman of the Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission, Billy Frank Jr. wrote a column called *Being Frank*.

From September 1986 to May 2014, these columns ran in NWIFC publications and newspapers across the Pacific Northwest. His words document the challenges that tribes faced as they exercised their treaty rights, fought to responsibly manage fisheries, and raised their voices against the loss of salmon habitat.







Healthy Meals on a Budget

I often hear people say 'eating healthy is expensive'; it can be, so instead, I plan to give you some pointers that I use to keep food within budget.

- Don't buy processed frozen foods. Forgo the frozen entrees. The protein content isn't the same as using fresh, and you pay more.
- Plan your weekly meals by what is on sale. I know this takes time, but it's well worth it.
- Keep your protein portion to 4 ounces (deck of cards). This is the most expensive part of the meal.
- Frozen or canned vegies can be cheaper than fresh and still be nutritious.

Fuel Your Superpowers!

Vitamin C is like a superhero for your immune system. It fights off those pesky colds and viruses like a BOSS!

Vitamin D-3 is the ultimate defender of your health. It acts as that superhero's shield to keep the germs away!

Elderberries, small but mighty! This superfood packs a powerful punch with antioxidants, nutrients, and vitamins.

Peninsula College Amends Faculty Union Agreements to Recognize Tribal Language Teaching Certifications

On January 17, 2023, leaders, faculty and staff from the Washington State Board on Community and Technical Colleges (WSBCTC), Peninsula College and 6 area Tribal Nations convened for a Government-to-Government Summit at the Peninsula College Longhouse. During the summit, Peninsula College President Suzy Ames announced before the summit attendees, there are some changes being made in the faculty union agreements relating to Indigenous Language courses.

Since Fall 2020, the Klallam Language has been offered for credit at the college. During a full academic year, 6 courses total are offered—3 in the 100 level and 3 in the 200 level. As of Fall 2022, the Makah Language began being offered for credit. Then in Winter 2023, the Quileute Language also began being offered for credit. All three Indigenous languages represent the 6 area Tribal Nations/Bands in the college service area. The nations/bands include Lower Elwha, Jamestown, Port Gamble, Makah, Quileute and Hoh.

Initially, faculty who did not have a master's or doctorate degree needed a 'Teacher of Record' in order for students to receive college credits. This is a requirement in western education. In President Ames' announcement to the Tribal Leaders, this requirement is no longer needed. Under the recent changes in the faculty union agreements, tribal language teaching certifications are now recognized. A similar change in agreements occurred at the Wenatchee College through the leadership of WSBCTC Director of Tribal Affairs, Lynn Palmanteer-Holder. Director Palmanteer-Holder graciously assisted Peninsula College with this important change.

What does this mean for the Klallam Language? Effective Spring 2023, our current language faculty, Jonathan Arakawa, Brooke Wellman, Loni Grinnell-Greninger and Karron McGrady, can independently co-teach the language without a teacher of record. Thanks to the efforts and background of our Linguist, Dr. Timothy (Tim) Montler, we have been able to teach with him as our teacher of record. Indigenous language teachers who don't have a master's or doctorate degree no longer a Teacher of Record. By having tribal teaching certifications finally acknowledged, the language teacher's names will be sufficient on the course title and syllabus, only if they are tribally certified language teachers.

Let me be very clear: Many of us are still dedicated to receiving higher education. Some of us are on that path currently. However, this change represents a huge AND great step in the right direction towards indigenizing and decolonizing education. Peninsula College is truly making progress.




Otter Class: This moth we have been focusing on number recognition, exploring the leaves and creating fun Valentine's Day art work!






March is Women's History Month!

This month we're celebrating Women's History Month by featuring some of our favorite books about women who have made history and who have helped to get us where we are today. Here are just of few examples:







- Classified: The Secret Career of Mary Golda Ross, Cherokee Aerospace Engineer by Traci Sorell: Mary Golda Ross
 worked on many classified projects as a twentieth-century aerospace engineer and much of what she did
 remains a secret to this day. Yet her work was of tremendous importance to the US space program, and she
 broke barriers as a Cherokee woman in a male-dominated field. Discover the story of how a math-loving girl from
 NE Oklahoma blazed a trail for herself and others, drawing on traditional Cherokee values throughout her career.
- She Persisted: 13 American Women Who Changed the World by Chelsea Clinton: This book presents the stories
 of 13 women who changed history, including Harriet Tubman, Helen Keller, Sally Ride, Maria Tallchief, and
 others. Each of these women persisted in the face of adversity and prejudice in a male-dominated world to smash
 the barriers in their way and change the world forever.
- Who Was Maria Tallchief? by Catherine Gourley: This biography tells the story of the Osage ballerina Maria
 Tallchief, whose love of dance took her all the way to becoming the first American Prima Ballerina. Tallchief will
 be featured on a quarter as part of the US Mint's American Women Quarters Program. Her quarter is scheduled
 to be released into circulation later this year.
- Mankiller: A Chief and Her People by Wilma Mankiller: Wilma Mankiller was the first woman Principle Chief of the Cherokee Nation. In her autobiography, Mankiller tells her story of how she rose to the position.

CDL Courses Available April 2023

Peninsula College has been awarded \$880,000 to expand it's CDL Program—What does this mean for you?

"With the addition of the 'Commercial Drivers License and Related Instructional Programs Fund (CDL Fund),' PC will be able to significantly increase CDL enrollment and therefore prepare more students for trucking and trucking-related supply chain industry jobs in the area."

The new funding will also allow the college to provide tuition assistance to students with financial need who have exhausted or do not qualify for funding from other sources such as the Washington Innovation and Opportunity Act, Basic Food Employment and Training, or Peninsula College Foundation.

"With CDL Fund support, we can increase enrollment from 40 students to 130 plus students per year while providing expanded tuition assistance,"

Does this make CDL Classes free?

No! CDL classes cost \$6995 per person to attend. With PC's new funding, you may be eligible for a partial tuition waiver, but you must apply for it. There are other funding sources available locally that can decrease your out of pocket expenses.
