I've enjoyed the comradery that we have shared.

In the same vein, I would like to welcome Melissa Gilman to Tribal Council. She comes from a respected family and has worked in our Finance Department for a number of years now. I don't think there is too much of a learning curve as far as a tribal organization, issues and projects. She is pretty savvy. I look forward to continued work with learning from her also.

Mowing lawns, clearing brush and making our place presentable again. Our youth have been working real hard. That is good to witness. I want to thank the Elwha Tribal Council for all their support during our mini hosting. Frances and Melissa took care of a lot of shopping and planning. Anthony used his boat to support from here to Alki Beach. Joaquin was available to help out where needed. I would name some more but I would miss a lot of them. Our whole tribe and staff have stepped up to make our mini hosting a success and safe place to be.

I have continued working on the various fishing issues. That is the work I really enjoy. Elwha Tribe is at the forefront on many issues. In addition to fishery issues we have a lot of negotiations dealing with shellfish. It is hard when another tribe digs in and doesn't want to be fair and equitable to each other. In the end we come together to agree upon something to get all of us on the water. I've learned that we don't always get what we want and no one is ever truly happy about the end result. But like I said, we get on the water. The process starts all over again in early January and will conclude in early March. I look forward to representing Elwha again. Thank you.

#### Diabetes Care Guidelines

Keeping healthy with the diagnosis of diabetes can be time consuming and challenging. The American Diabetes Association created diabetes care guidelines to help keep you healthy and offset complications. Our goal is to keep you healthy!

- Having an eye exam once a year. Diabetes can damage blood vessels in the retina.
- Teeth cleaning twice a year. Glucose increases bacteria and plaque buildup.
- Yearly foot exam from your PCP. Checking for nerve and blood flow.
- A1C test. Ideally 3-4 times a year. Your 3 month blood sugar average. Goal <8.</li>
- Lipid test. Once a year for your cholesterol and triglycerides.

I will be calling you in the next few months updating this information in your chart.

#### Did you know?

It only take 150 minutes of exercise a week to keep your heart healthy! That is only 20 minutes a day, but only 1 in 4 people meet this goal. Are you one of them?



#### Food Additives to Avoid

How they can harm you—-and where they may lurk.

Over the past two decades hundreds of food additives have entered the food system without rigorous safety review by the FDA. Consumer Reports have been focusing on these 5:

- Brominated vegetable oil-used in soft and sports drinks to keep ingredients from separating. It builds up in the body and can affect the thyroid, memory and cause headaches. (iemountain dew, squirt)
- Potassium bromate— an oxidizing agent that makes bread swell and doughy. Potential for cancers and headaches. Also called bromated flour. (ie-bagels, pizza dough ,bread)
- Propyl paraben

  A preservative used in pastry, tortillas and cosmetics. Found to disrupt hormones. Companies like weight watchers, little Debbie, sara lee use this.
- Red Dye #3- A synthetic dye made from petroleum. Used in food and drinks to give its red color. Linked to cancer and ADHD.
- Titanium dioxide- A powder added to whiten foods and products. On label may say 'color added'. Accumulates in the body and can have a carcinogenic effect. Found in skittles, coffee creamer, gummies, etc.

Currently all 5 of these products are banned in

Europe Union & Japan, but allowed in the USA.



2023 Graduation was a huge success. Thank you to all who help decorate, clean up, cooks, servers, parents, and donors. We couldn't do this without you.






























### Summer Youth in Natural Resources share their experiences

## **Bridget Weed**

is in her second Summer working with the Wildlife team, spending most of her time helping maintain camera traps and analyze the photo data that is collected. She has also had the opportunity to join attempted cougar captures for collaring. Bridget says that even when she's not in the field, she really enjoys looking through the images at all of the different wildlife. Bridget likes learning about plants and birds too, and has become more confident moving through the woods to find her own routes.



When not finding her way in the forest, Bridget looks through hundreds (sometimes thousands!) of images collected by one motion-sensor camera to monitor wildlife activity.

"One time there was a picture of a bobcat looking directly into the camera! I get surprised by how much the animals are actually all around. When I'm out in the field & see all of their tracks, I wonder how they can be so big & be unnoticed!?"



has spent the past three summers working with Natural Resources, mainly helping with Fisheries research and monitoring. When Javier started, he didn't realize Natural Resources involved so many things! He has helped with tagging and collecting DNA from fish, conducting snorkel surveys for salmon, seining the Elwha estuary to count and measure fish, and even sorting through sediment samples this year to see what food is available for fish living in the estuary. Javier says one of his favorite parts of the job is releasing salmon after they catch them for tagging.

"I like to see how fast they are, how strong. I enjoy all of the things we do and I look forward to coming here every day in Summer."

Javier spends a lot of time in the water, either geared up in waders to count and measure fish in the estuary or fully prepared to swim in a drysuit for snorkeling the mainstem Elwha River and looking for returning salmon.

## Olympic Peninsula Crews





CHIMACUM/NORTH OLYMPIC SALMON COALITION: Based on the beautiful Olympic Peninsula, this crew is sponsored by the North Olympic Salmon Coalition, WCC AmeriCorps members on this crew will improve habitat for salmon and wildlife throughout Jefferson and Clallam Counties. The crew partners with many different natural resource management organizations. The crew is primarily focused on riparian improvement but may also conduct trail projects, minor construction, noxious weed control, salmon surveys and more. Weed control may be done with hand tools, machines, and or herbicide.

PORT ANGELES/DNR RECREATION: This crew serves with Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The crew is based out of Port Angeles and serves primarily on the North Olympic Peninsula. Eighty percent of the projects focus on restoring degraded and eroding recreational trails including multi-use trail systems such as 4x4, hiking, stock, undesignated (user-built) sites and designated trails. The remaining twenty percent of projects focus on campground maintenance, habitat restoration, and invasive species removal.

PORT ANGELES/CLALLAM COUNTY MULTIPLE SPONSORS: Based in Port Angeles with the Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe, this crew will serve across the Olympic Peninsula to support the efforts of several partners in both habitat restoration and recreational access improvement. This crew will serve with state, tribal, federal and non-profit organizations and gain experience in riparian restoration, noxious weed control, and trail work while serving in beautiful locations.

PORT ANGELES/OLYMPIC NATIONAL PARK & MULTIPLE SPONSORS: This crew will serve with Olympic National Park for the majority of the term. Our schedule is typically Tuesday to Friday from 7 a.m. - 5:30 p.m. and we meet in Port Angeles at the National Park Headquarters. The crew serves with other partners during winter months, typically completing restoration projects. Projects for Olympic National Park include building and maintaining front and backcountry trails throughout the park. trail feature construction and carpentry, erosion control, chainsaw projects, campgrounds maintenance, and more. In the summer, we will adopt the eight days on, six days off "spike" schedule, and camp in the backcountry. Stock support is often available in the form of 4-8 mules for longer trips. Food and lodging (camping access) is provided on all spike assignments.

Must be \*18-25 years old. Members earn a living allowance of \$1253 twice a month (\$2506 per month, pre-tax) and an AmeriCorps Education Award upon successful completion of their term. Formal and informal training is provided. Educational loan forbearance, health insurance and a Member Assistance Program (MAP) are available. Strong preference will be given to Washington state residents. Successful applicants will be required to verify their vaccination record or seek a medical or religious exemption for the 22-23 service term. \*Age restrictions do not apply to those with military service or with mental or sensory disabilities.

Term lengths available: WCC offers three service term lengths. 11-month positions begin in October, 9-month positions begin in January, and 3-month positions begin in June. All terms end in early September.









"I'm Kristin Kirkman, the supervisor for the Washington Conservation Corps crew you've probably seen driving around in those big blue trucks! In collaboration with the LEKT Natural Resources and other sponsors, our crew does restoration work such as invasive species treatment, planting native species, and monitoring/maintenance of riparian zones around the Olympic Peninsula. Our crew is hiring 18-25 year olds or veterans who are interested in learning about riparian restoration, power tool use, native plant identification, trail work, and more! This AmeriCorps service position is a great opportunity for people who are new to the ecology field and want a wide breadth of experience in fieldwork. Members receive on-the-job training, certifications, biweekly stipends, and a scholarship at the completion of their term. No experience is required!

## Tribal Member Elected to Serve as Co-President for National Native Organization - UNITY, Inc.

Washington, D.C. — United National Indian Tribal Youth, Inc. (UNITY) recently hosted the 2023 National UNITY Conference in Washington, DC. 2,400+ Native youth and advisors traveled to the Nation's capital to network and learn. Throughout the week, conference attendees experienced an empowering and inspiration-infused agenda with keynote speakers, panels, workshops, regional caucuses, business meeting, and more.

UNITY's 10 regions hosted 2 caucuses each at the conference, allowing Native youth to address issues in their communities. 140+ Native youth from the Northwest Region attended the conference, representing Tribal Nations located in Washington, Alaska, Oregon and Idaho. As outgoing Northwest Representative, Jonathan Arakawa chaired the Northwest caucuses. "Thank you Northwest Region for allowing me to serve you the past 2 years. We've seen tremendous growth and incredible progress. I've been honored to serve with amazing Executive Committee members who worked tirelessly to uphold UNITY's Mission and Vision," remarked Jonathan Arakawa on his term. "From Native youth leading their communities out of unprecedented times, to revitalizing youth programming, the strength and spirit of Native youth has been stronger than ever. I have no doubt in my mind that you'll continue a path towards reciprocity and restitution."

The National UNITY Council held elections for its Executive Committee. The Executive Committee is comprised of 12 members, consisting of a male and female Co-President and 10 regional representatives, who are elected by the National UNITY Council.

Mr. Arakawa took a healthy risk and ran for the Male Co-President position. He recently completed his 2<sup>nd</sup> and final term as Secretary and Northwest Representative. It opened the way for two region members to run for the position. To fill his place, Mazie Countryman was elected. "I'm honored to pass the torch to our newly elected Northwest Representative, Mazie Countryman," said Arakawa. Ms. Countryman proudly represents the Northern Arapaho, Navajo and Eastern Shoshone. "I have full faith and confidence in her ability to lead our region to greater heights."

Mr. Arakawa was elected to serve as Co-President on July 2, 2023. He will serve with 11 other members. "I'm honored to have been duly elected to serve as Co-President on the National UNITY Council Executive Committee," remarked Arakawa on his election. "I'm looking forward to the progress we make this term."






