Letter From the Co-Chair

October 2023

Dear Lower Elwha Tribal Community,

October is already upon us. Halloween is near. Of course we have Columbus Day upon us also. We don't celebrate that day. We turned it into Indigenous Day. I like what former Senator Ben Nighthorse Campbell said about Columbus. Ben Nighthorse Campbell is an Air Force Veteran. He said something like, "I can say for all Native American Veterans, We are happy Columbus wasn't looking for Turkey!" Indian humor for sure.

I wanted to encourage our membership and community to use our food bank more. Right now it is used by our outside community more than our people use it. The Elwha Food Bank has quality food and it is very easy to access. Not many questions about you or your family. I think we just want to know how many people in your residence. Anyway... check it out.

Elwha Tribe applied for a grant that will bring more food to us. Funding that can be used for seafood, elk, deer and other traditional foods. This will be separate from our food bank and just for our community. I don't know when we will actually have the funding but I know that it has been awarded. When we have give more details, I will be sure to share.

There has been much news about the Place Road Clear Cut. Our Council and staff have looked into this cut. We feel that it will not affect the Elwha River and the restoration efforts that have taken place. Personally, I don't want any trees cut near our river. Washington State Department of Natural Resources has done everything by the book. Meaning that they followed the law. The only way Elwha Tribe could stop it is by changing the law. Now... Elwha Tribe did have a hand in stopping the proposed gravel pit a few years back. I am proud of that. I know we have some members that think we could stop the cut. We evaluated the situation and came to the conclusion not to engage. We will make sure they do follow the law and monitor.

By the time you read this letter we will have more funding available at the transfer station in Port Angeles for free dumping. This is a very expensive benefit for our members but Elwha Council feels it is necessary. There are always members and outsiders that take advantage of this free dump. For example, some have given or loaned their Tribal I. D. to outsiders for them to dump free. When we find out about this activity, we take that individuals benefit away. We have stopped the commercial use and the dumping of engines and boats. It is supposed to be for household garbage.

This month we start our first fishery in the Elwha River. YaHoo!!!! It is a very exciting time and I will report out on how it goes in my next letter. I know we will be successful and our fishers will have a fair shot at taking home Coho Salmon. It has been eleven long years since we have had nets in the water. Although I do not participate in hook and line fishery, mostly because I am not good at it! I am excited to have our fishers on the river with fishing

fishing poles also. We have been very patient waiting for our opportunity to renew our fishery and traditions on the river.

We just finished up with our Budget Retreat. We have to tighten up a little bit. I think we are in a good place. We haven't finalized anything yet but we are getting closer. Our budget process is time consuming. Council and lead staff have been working diligently to get it done. Thank you Tonya Greene, Froilan and Company. These years I don't have a dark and gloomy outlook towards budget work. The ominous cloud isn't hanging over my head anymore. I actually look forward to spending time on our budget. Full council and lead staff are present. We discuss what our needs are and plan to achieve them. Of course, the Strategic Plan is always in the front of my mind when I think about our budget.

Elwha Council and staff visited our US Coast Guard Station Port Angeles recently. USCG is wanting to deal with bank erosion that is taking away the spit and potentially some buildings at the station. They want to use rip rap and we want to discuss use a more natural protection such as logs. They are willing to listen to us as we do have rights out there and Government to Government laws. I think we can work together.

Thank you again for taking the time to read my letter. I will be back with another one next month.

Types and example of domestic violence/abuse: From Power and Control Wheel Physical – Coercion, threats, intimidation, push, sexual violence/abuse, kill, destroying things, and /or abuse pet

Emotional – name calling, humiliating victim

Financial – not allowing partner to get a job, have no access to family income **Social** – controlling and limiting victim whereabouts and what she does

Psychological – blaming, minimizing and denying victim

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS MEDICAL TRAVEL

Who is eligible for medical travel:

Lower Elwha Klallam Tribal members who are PRC/CHS eligible.

What is medical travel:

Medical travel for PRC is funds used to assit tribal members who have apointments outside of Clallam county. This program pays for a perdiem stipend of \$50 per day, per tribal member. Hotel stay if applicable, and fuel of \$50(Bremerton) \$75 King county. Ferry passes

What are the requirements:

PRC is the payer of last resort, tribal members who have Medicaid will need to utilize those services first for Fuel and Ferry. You will be required to submit a travel form (available at the clinic) with proof of appt outside Clallam county.

FAQ:

- Travel forms must be submitted 10 busniness day before travel.(this gives accounting time to process checks)
- In house items include(ferry passes and fuel vouchers)
- Forms turned in will be processed in accordance with the policies, you will be called if more information is needed.
- · The policies for medical travel can be found on the front page of the travel form.
- All efforts are made to get thing processed quickly, turning things in before travel helps us insure that we can help you with your travel needs.
- Upon return of travel all receipts must be turned in or you will be denied for future medical travel assistance.
- · If you lose a receipt we have a lost receipt form that must be submitted.
- We only pay for patient and driver (in cases) for perdiem.
- Hotel are only authorized for appts that require you to be there before 9 am. Elders that time is 10am.
- Summer time is hard to get hotels as we are a tourist spot on the northwest. We
 ask that you make all regular appointments for later times during the summer
 months as we cannot guarantee a hotel room for you.
- If you have Medicaid insurance you will need to submit your driver license, car insurance and car registration to <u>Fueldocs@paratransit.net</u> and call 1-800-756-5438 to set up account and get fuel card and ferry card
- We will always help with travel until you get set up with paratransit, and in case that paratransit denies services, with denial in writing.

The event begins with a reading by Arianne True, the <u>2023-2025 Washington State Poet</u> <u>Laureate</u>. A member of the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations, Arianne is a queer poet and teaching artist. She has received fellowships and residencies from Jack Straw, the Hugo House, Artist Trust, and the Seattle Repertory Theater, and is an alum of Hedgebrook and of the MFA program at the Institute of American Indian Arts.

Following Arianne's reading, there will be an open mic for Indigenous community members to share their poetry. A sign-up sheet will be available at the event and participation by Native poets of all experience levels is encouraged.

At the request of a key event participant, attendees are asked to avoid using strong fragrances.

Indigenous Peoples' Day is a national holiday that honors the Indigenous peoples of what is now known as North America. First celebrated in 1992 on the second Monday in October, Indigenous Peoples' Day was officially proclaimed a national holiday in 2021. The 2023-2024 school year is off to a great start. This is the 3rd year of having Klallam language classes at SMS, & the 24th year for PAHS. This is my 3rd year as a school-teacher and I'm so happy to be able to learn from & work with Jamie Valadez as a mentor teacher, who taught at PAHS since 1999 and directed the language program since it's inception in 1992. In her "retirement" she is still pushing the language forward by training me, working with linguist Tim Montler to revise the Klallam grammar lessons & create student workbooks & elder's story books for classroom use with

a lesson schedule & assessments. With funding and support from the ANA American Rescue Plan Grant, the Lower Elwha Tribe and Port Angeles School District we've been able to carry on this important work in the schools despite the challenges we faced during COVID. We hope to keep developing and implementing curriculum for many years to come.

The school year is upon us! I have spent the beginning of the school year working with our Klallam Language Class at Stevens Middle School. We have 20 students this semester. It is our biggest group yet. I have also been meeting with the administrators and departments (i.e., Social Studies, Science, and English) at Stevens in upholding our mission to implement tribal curriculum and culture across campus.

Over the last 2 years, we have successfully piloted curriculum in Social Studies, Science, and English. This year will focus on building on that incredible moment and cultivate access to all school staff to use in the classroom. This will restart as soon as the week of September 28, 2023 in science for their Elwha River field trips.

Other goals for this year is to increase our tribal presence at Stevens. Some of the ideas include translating monthly traits into Klallam Language, share Phrases of the Week in Klallam during morning announcements, and incorporate language and culture during school assemblies and the Native American after school homework club ran by our Education Department staff member.



Christmas is right around the corner and Shop With a Hero ramping up with fundraising. Shop With a Hero is a local program modeled after Shop With a Cop. Children are referred to the program through various programs. Each child is paired with a local "hero" – a local law enforcement officer from one of many local departments. There have been volunteers from Port Angeles Police Department, Clallam County Sheriff's Officer, Lower Elwha Police Department, Sequim Police, Port Gamble S'Klallam Police, US Coast Guard, National Parks Enforcement, and Washington State Patrol (to name a few). Each child is given \$100 to Christmas shop for themselves or their family with the help of the hero they are paired with. Gift wrapping is available at the event, as well as pictures with Santa Clause, cookie decorating, hot cocoa, and an opportunity for children to tour the various police/first responder vehicles.

This year the program is hosting a silent auction to raise money for the event. Organizers are seeking donations from local businesses and artists for the event. The auction will be November 10th, at the Heritage Center. More information will be available as plans are laid out. A Facebook page will be set up for Shop With a Hero in the near future. Keep an eye out there for more details about the silent auction and the event itself in December.

On September 8, the Lower Elwha Police Department hosted a small awards ceremony at the Justice Center. The ceremony was attended by friends, family and tribal leadership.

The department recognized officers for their promotion into various positions. Ernest Grimes was promoted to Sr. Sergeant. Dan LaTourette was promoted to Corporal. Jim Thompson was promoted to Lieutenant. Cody Hesler was assigned as Detective, and Alex Hamrick was assigned as Training Manager shortly after the promotions. These promotions and assignments were earlier in the year, but the officers were recognized all on one day.





Two officers, Detective Cody Hesler and

Officer Alex Hamrick, received medals. Detective Hesler received two life-saving awards. Officer Hamrick received a life-saving award and a meritorious service medal.

In 2022, Detective Hesler was at a community event representing the Lower Elwha Police Department/Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe. During the event a child began choking. Using his first aid training, Detective Hesler was able to render aid to the child and prevent a further medical emergency. Detective Hesler was awarded a life-saving award for his actions.

In May of 2023 Detective Hesler and Officer Hamrick responded to multiple incidents where they were able to save a community mem-

ber's life. In one incident they were able to quickly assess the situation and come to the conclusion that an individual had consumed opioids and had overdosed. They acted quickly and administered naloxone to reverse the effects of the ingested opioids. Detective Hesler and Officer Hamrick were awarded a life-saving medal for their actions.

The following day the same two officers responded to a similar situation. However, naloxone

had been administered prior to their arrival. Detective Hesler and Officer Hamrick searched for the person to try and convince him to get medical aid. Officer Hamrick was able to find him and attempted to start a dialogue. The person refused to talk and continued walking away. Eventually the person came upon a bluff and intended to throw himself over the embankment. Officer Hamrick physically restrained the person as long as he could, putting his own safety in jeopardy in an attempt to save the person's life. Officer Hamrick was awarded a meri-
